by the participants of the conference on Water and Heritage: Connecting Past, Present and Future, March 20, 2023, contributing to the UN 2023 Water Conference in New York

Directed to the UN 2023 Water Conference, UNESCO and the UN system as a whole and its partners; those responsible for high-level water-related international cooperation and events; governments and ministries as well as academia; cultural heritage and water organizations and authorities on all levels around the world; politicians and decision-makers; water education, scientists and technical specialists; civil society, activists, young people, and all other stakeholders.

Mandate:

Recommendations: Initiate multi-stakeholder dialogues jointly by water professionals and heritage experts at local, national, and global levels to raise awareness, deepen mutual understanding, inspire and strengthen the cultural values of water and commit tangible actions on significance of water-related heritages for the sustainable future.

The conference brought together a diverse and interdisciplinary group of professionals and academics from the water, culture, and heritage fields with the goal to bridge mandatory, disciplinary and institutional divides, and a wide audience, including heritage and water professionals, researchers, decision makers, public servants, spatial planners, Indigenous people, young professionals, artist and activists, approximately 120 participants from about 20 nations around the world.

Encouraged by the recommendations of the Tokyo symposium we acknowledge that culture and heritage is now on the agenda of the UN 2023 Water Conference. The participants express a deep conviction that culture and heritage are important pillars for sustainable development, inform climate change mitigation and adaptation, and improve current and future water management, planning, practices, awareness and engagement.









Recommendations

Create an international platform on water, culture and heritage to connect knowledge and practices through time and space in a structured way for relevant institutions, professionals, and stakeholders, contributing to mitigation, adaptation and water-related challenges in support of sustainable development.

This water, culture and heritage platform should:

- 1. Promote research, such as national compendia and international thematic studies on the enduring significance and values of tangible and intangible aspects of water, culture and heritage including as living assets for livelihoods;
- 2. Develop a shared and comprehensive historical understanding of water systems in political, societal, economic sustainable development;
- 3. Initiate and carry out cross-sectorial, multi-stakeholder dialogues that connect water and heritage professionals, scientists, decision-makers, local councils, Indigenous people, activists and other organisations at local, national and international levels;
- 4. Include water-related culture and heritage into the Valuing Water Concept and the Valuing Water Journeys;
- 5. Document, synthesise and utilise traditional best practices, management systems, knowledge and skills through open access publication;
- 6. Promote the significance of water-related culture and heritage into the SDG 6 on water and other water-related goals and targets;
- 7. Introduce living water-related heritage into policies for water management, such as Integrated Water Resources Management, the Valuing Water Concept as well as in relevant heritage concepts;
- 8. Include the rich history of water, culture and heritage, into capacity building programmes at universities, practical training and other means;
- 9. Develop educational and public awareness-raising tools and programmes using visual aids and contemporary media.
